The International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination (CERD)

> RATIFIED BY USA (1965/1969)

Major Provisions of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination (CERD)

Article 1: Defines racial discrimination and the scope of the convention

Article 2

1.Condemn racial discrimination and undertake to pursue by all appropriate means <u>and without delay</u> a policy of eliminating racial discrimination in all its forms <u>and promoting understanding among all races</u>...

2. Take special and concrete measures to ensure the adequate development and protection of certain racial groups or individuals belonging to them, for the purpose of guaranteeing them the full and equal enjoyment of human rights and fundamental freedoms. (Note: The US has stated a reservation to article 2)

Article 3: Condemn racial segregation and apartheid and undertake to prevent, prohibit and eradicate all practices of this nature

Article 4:

States parties:

(a) Shall declare an offence punishable by law all dissemination of ideas based on racial superiority or hatred, incitement to racial discrimination, as well as all acts of violence or incitement to such acts against any race or group of persons of another color or ethnic origin, and also, the provision of any assistance to racist activities, including the financing thereof.

(b) Shall declare illegal and prohibit organizations, and also, organized and all other propaganda activities, which promote and incite racial discrimination, and shall recognize participation in such organizations or activities as an offence punishable by law.

(c) Shall not permit public authorities or public institutions, national or local, to promote or incite racial discrimination.

Note: The U.S. has stated a reservation to this article based on First Amendment rights.

Article 5

- a) The right to equal treatment before the tribunals and all other organs administering justice
- b) The right to security of person and protection by the State against violence or bodily harm
- c) Political rights
- d) Civil rights
- e) Economic, Social and Cultural Rights
- f) The right of access to any place or service intended for use by the general public

Article 7:

States Parties shall undertake to adopt <u>immediate and effective measures</u>, <u>particularly</u> <u>in the fields of teaching</u>, <u>education</u>, <u>culture and</u> <u>information</u>, with a view to combating prejudices which lead to racial discrimination and to promoting understanding, tolerance and friendship among nations and racial or ethnic groups.

The Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (CERD)

Article 8- 1.

There shall be established a <u>Committee on the Elimination of Racial</u> <u>Discrimination</u> (hereinafter referred to as the Committee) consisting of eighteen experts of high moral standing and acknowledged impartiality elected by States Parties from among their nationals, who shall serve in their personal capacity, consideration being given to equitable geographical distribution and to the representation of the different forms of civilization as well as of the principal legal systems.

Article 9-2.

The Committee shall report annually, through the Secretary General, to the General Assembly of the United Nations on its activities and may make suggestions and general recommendations based on the examination of the reports and information received from the States Parties. Such suggestions and general recommendations shall be reported to the General Assembly together with comments, if any, from States Parties.

Examples from

The Concluding Observations of the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination

United States of America

Overall

Take special measures to eliminate persistent disparities; ensure the adequate development and protection of members of racial, ethnic and national minorities.

Consider: the prohibition of all ideas based upon racial superiority or hatred *is compatible with* the right to freedom of opinion and expression.

Education

End *de facto* segregation and racial inequalities

Reduce the persistent educational "achievement gap" ... by improving the quality of education

Review "zero tolerance" school discipline policies. Limit suspension or expulsion to the most serious case.



Provide public housing complexes outside poor, racially segregated areas

Intensify efforts aimed at reducing residential segregation and its negative consequences

Eliminate obstacles that limit affordable housing choice and mobility for Section 8 beneficiaries

Employment & Health

Combat de facto discrimination.

E.g., Increase the use of "pattern and practice" investigations.

Address persistent health disparities and eliminate obstacles

E.g., lack of health insurance, unequal distribution of health care resources, persistent racial discrimination, poor quality of public health care services.

Criminal Justice System

Stark racial disparities, including the disproportionate number of persons belonging to racial, ethnic and national minorities in the prison population, are factual indicators of racial discrimination.

Take all necessary steps to guarantee the right of everyone to equal treatment, including implementing national strategies or plans of action aimed at the elimination of structural racial discrimination.

Accountability & Awareness

Hold transnational corporations registered in the U.S. accountable for acts which negatively impact on the enjoyment of rights of indigenous peoples outside the U.S.

Organize broad public awareness and education programs on the Convention and its provisions. Comply with the "Right to Know Our Rights." Application: How can we use this? Do these observations ring true? Are they relevant?
